**Course Description:**

ROME STUDY CENTRE ONLY. This 10-week course provides students with basic vocabulary and phrases to cope with authentic everyday situations. It is designed for those students who prefer the communicative approach with less emphasis on language structure analysis.

- develop students' interest in the language learning process
- provide students with basic skills to understand the spoken language in simple, everyday contexts

**Indicative Content:**

Useful, basic grammar and vocabulary; basic structures

- Greeting and presenting oneself
- Ordering in a restaurant, pizzeria, or bar
- Describing a city, giving directions
- Conversation: travel, activities, sport
- Buying tickets; making a booking

**Teaching Methodology:**

Classes are conducted mainly in Italian and take a functional approach to language learning. Students are not expected to understand every word but to attempt to grasp the key points and the overall meaning. Participation and team work are encouraged in class. The instructor not only guides and corrects, but also challenges students to immerse themselves in the linguistic experience. Focus is on oral communication skills both in comprehension and language production.
